The 2022 fall showcase, centered around a single theme, will feature performances choregraphed by both UT Martin students and faculty. Student choreographers include Maleia Bigham, a first-year dance education major from Polk County; Lanna-Kate Graves, a first-year dance education

major from Weakley County; and Marlee Scott, a sophomore dance education major from Williamson County. These three students will also perform in the show. Sarah McCormick, director of ensemble and professor of dance, choreographed three new dances for the fall show.

Student performers not involved in choreography include Madison Bixler, a first-year dance education major from Obion County; Abby Walker, a firstyear dance education major from Rutherford County; and Shelby Kruep, a sophomore theatre arts major from DuPage County, Illinois.

Tickets are \$15 for general admission, \$10 for students, and children 10 and under are free. Tickets will be sold at the door starting at 6 p.m. the night of the show and can be purchased with cash or check. 19TH ANNUAL EMPTY BOWLS EVENT TO BE HELD NOV.19

UT Martin and We Care Ministries Inc. will co-host the 19th-annual Empty Bowls event from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m., Nov. 19, in the Boling University Center Duncan Ballroom.

Empty Bowls, a fundraiser to fight hunger one bowl at a time, was founded in 2003 by retired UT Martin art professor and potter David McBeth. Donors will receive a handcrafted bowl for each \$15 donation with all proceeds supporting We Care Ministries, Inc. The bowls are made by McBeth; Jason Woolery, lecturer in the Department of Visual and Theatre Arts; and UT Martin students. The traditional Empty Bowls soup meal, canceled because of the pandemic, will return for the first time since 2019. With each donation, guests will be able to enjoy an all-you-can-eat soup lunch provide by community members.

The project not only benefits the community, but also serves as a hands-on learning opportunity for students. "Students gain a sense of community by helping with the bowl making and glazing and by helping with the project the day of the event," said McBeth.

We Care Ministries was founded in 1973 and receives no government funding. All monetary donations are used to





- Answer The City of Martin Fire Department reports that hydrants are color coded based on flow volume (gallons per minute or GPM). The colors and what the colors represent are as follows: blue = 1,500 GPM and up; green = 1,000 to 1,499 GPM; orange = 500 to 999 GPM; red = 0 to 499 GPM; and black = not for firefighting use.
