WUTM SWEEPS CATEGORIES AT TAB AWARDS PROGRAM

UT Martin's student-operated radio station, WUTM 90.3 "The Hawk," was awarded first and second places in both categories offered in the college competitions at the inaugural Tennessee Association of Broadcasters "Excellence in Broadcasting" awards banquet. The event was held Oct. 4 at the Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville.

The Radio Horizon award was awarded to the best up-andcoming college radio reporter or personality. Blaine McDonald, a senior broadcasting student from Martin, received this award recognizing the newscasts she has anchored. Dylan Ingram, a senior media design major also from Martin, received second place for his newscasts and spot reporting.

"I was honestly extremely shocked to have won the Radio Horizon award," said McDonald. "To win this award makes me truly grateful for everything I have learned at UTM."

The best radio news, sports or event coverage award was presented to Shannon Sullivan, a 2022 meteorology graduate from Colorado Springs, Colorado, for her "severe weather coverage" on WUTM. Second place went to Davis Gregory, a senior broadcasting major from Knoxville,

UT Martin staff members highlighted for success of ACT program

Two UT Martin staff members were highlighted for their work with ACT prep through a joint celebration between ACT, Inc., and the Tennessee Department of Education held on Oct. 25 in Nashville. Jennifer Cooper and Alex Beene were present as the Tennessee Department of Education and received the inaugural ACT State Equity and Access Champion Award.

In 2021, UT Martin partnered with the department of education to provide all Tennessee high school students and teachers with access to free, virtual workshops. Office hours and classes focused on how to succeed on the ACT are also available. The UTM ACT Prep Program is funded by a \$199,950 grant from the Tennessee Department of Education.

Through the partnership, 165 workshops have been offered serving a total of 2,241 students, eight mastery classes have been offered serving a total of 169 students, and 13 teacher workshops have been offered training nearly 200 students.

Cooper and Beene were recognized for these efforts and invited to present at the Tennessee Department of Education for CTE Educators conference in Chattanooga, July 19-21.

"Tennessee students deserve our guidance and support achieve postsecondary to and career success," said UT Martin Chancellor Keith "The Carver. Tennessee Department of Education is an important partner in providing ACT prep and the other resources that students need to thrive in our changing economy and world."

The ACT provides an important opportunity for Tennessee to understand students' college and career readiness and how to prepare the next generation to transition to post-secondary opportunities.

Fuqua is the director of the UT Martin Regional Entrepreneurship and Economic Development Center. She has been with the REED Center since 2006 and has served as the director for over 10 years. Under her leadership, clients at the center reported more than \$40 million in economic impact to the Small Business Administration. Under Fuqua's direction, the REED Center assisted 66 businesses with disaster relief, allowing them to retain 253 jobs and distributing \$1.8 million in aid during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Landy Fuqua is professional, hardworking and an excellent ambassador for UTM in many important on-and-off campus activities. She is truly deserving of this semester's exempt Outstanding Employee Award," said a nomination form.

Jackson is assistant to the dean of the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences. MOUNTAIN DEW, MARKETING AND UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH

The UT Martin Research Series will explore the citrus soda Mountain Dew at 4 p.m., Nov. 14, in the north reading room of the Paul Meek Library through a presentation open to the public. Students in an undergraduate marketing course will report the outcomes of their head-tohead taste test, reminiscent of the Pepsi Challenge, in which modern Mountain Dew is compared to Mountain Dew Throwback.

Brands continuously adapt their products to changing consumer preferences. Over time, "new" products become the "original" to younger consumers, allowing a brand to introduce a "throwback" version using earlier formulas and marketing tools. This was the case with Mountain Dew Throwback, reintroduced by Pepsi in 2009 to allow modern consumers access to the more "original" flavor.

The presentation will review the history of the Pepsi Challenge, arguably Pepsi's most successful advertising campaign, as background to the UTM student group's modern-day application. Data collected from university students provides insights into the efficacy of Pepsi's strategic decisions when adapting products to changing consumer preferences. The presentation will share data collected by 30 students as part of their consumer behavior course taught by Christian Bushardt, a lecturer in UTM's College of Business and Global Affairs.

Participants are also encouraged to tour a traveling exhibit titled, "It'll Tickle Yore Innards!" about the development and history of Mountain Dew. Curated by the East Tennessee Historical Society, the exhibit utilizes historical photographs, advertising and marketing material, and a collection of original artifacts to reveal the Tennessee roots of this internationally famous beverage. The exhibit remains on display in the J. Houston Gordon Museum in the Paul Meek Library through January 2023.

The monthly UT Martin Research Series highlights the research of campus faculty, staff and students. In addition to cosponsors, the Paul Meek Library and the Division of Academic Affairs, the event is supported with free refreshments and giveaway items provided by Pepsi MidAmerica.

Parking for the reception will be in the Paul Meek Library parking lot on Wayne Fisher Drive off Mt. Pelia Road.
