UT Martin fall commencement set for Dec. 10

UT Martin will hold fall commencement exercises during two in-person ceremonies Saturday, Dec. 10, in the Kathleen and Tom Elam Center. Commencement times are 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., and tickets are not required to attend either ceremony. Doors will open 45 minutes before each event begins.

UT Martin Chancellor Keith Carver will preside over the two ceremonies, and University of Tennessee System President Randy Boyd will provide the commencement address and confer degrees at both events. Students who graduated following the 2022 summer and fall terms will participate. A sign-language interpreter will provide services for the hearing impaired during both commencement events.

The 10 a.m. ceremony will include undergraduate and graduate-degree candidates from the colleges of agriculture and applied sciences, and business and global affairs. Preserving West Tennessee history

The stories that document people, towns and history of West Tennessee are preserved in repositories across the region. Results of a survey of cultural institutions in the state's West Grand Division will be the focus of a presentation at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 15, at the Martin Public Library. The survey confirmed each agency's status and created an institution-level summary of research collections, staffing, budget and preservation conditions for heritage materials.

Sam Richardson, UT Martin archivist and museum curator, and Dr. Erik Nordberg, dean of the Paul Meek Library, will provide an overview of the project, funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Much of the detailed work was completed by graduate research assistant, Elysia Duke, and four summer student interns.

During the Dec. 15 event, they will share their experiences traveling to more than 100 agencies across 21 counties to gather data, assess the general status of collections and encourage future collaboration.

This event is part of the UTM Research Series and is cosponsored by the Martin Public Library, the Weakley County Historical and Genealogical Society, the Division of Academic Affairs and the Paul Meek Library. The event is free and open to the public.

You Tell Me

Editor's note: The Division of Finance and Administration emailed a list of common policy questions to the university community in September. This is one of the items from that list. The question is added to fit the Addenda format.

- Question Is there a process for reporting accidents that happen during the course of employment with the university?
- Answer All accidents involving a third party (pedestrian) or their vehicle, while driving a university vehicle, rental, or your own vehicle in the course of your employment, must be reported to the university and to the State of Tennessee within 24 hours. The state will impose a \$1,000 penalty on accidents involving a third party not reported within 24 hours. For more information, please contact Business Services.
