# UT MARTIN ACHIEVES NEW RECORD FOR CAPTAIN'S CHALLENGE

UT Martin set new records of \$470,000 raised and approximately 1,400 gifts for the eighth annual "Captain's C h allenge—Captain's Challenge—Captain less than 24 hours on April 6. The records were achieved in plenty of time for Captain to make it back to his residence hall room before anyone realized he had taken the day off.

This year's Captain's Challenge theme was based on the popular 1986 film, "Ferris Bueller's Day Off." Viewers saw Captain Skyhawk fake an illness to get out of attending a home Skyhawk game so he could fundraise for Captain's Challenge instead. With the help of two students, Captain went door to door searching for donors. Through these efforts and the help of the UT Martin community and alumni, the goal of \$400,000 was exceeded with more than five hours remaining in the day.



## Fashion Merchandising students attend Las Vegas MagicMart Trade Show

MagicMart, located in Las Vegas, is the most comprehensive fashion trade show in the country. This year, eight fashion merchandising students from UT Martin made their first trip and met with brand representatives, attended educational sessions and got a first look at the upcoming fashion trends.

The trade show, which was held in the Las Vegas Convention Center, featured three different halls: one dedicated to the brands' booths and educational sessions, one dedicated to men's wear and streetwear and one dedicated to materials and sustainability. Students visited booths belonging to established and up-and-coming brands such as Pura Vida, Ugg, and Wasabi + Mint, networked with brand representatives and learned about topics important to their studies, such as perfecting their brand pitch and forecasting upcoming trends.

When Peyton Ross (pictured front row, middle), a senior from Caruthersville, Missouri, began studying fashion merchandising, she never expected to meet a personality from one of her favorite television shows, let alone receive professional advice from one.

"I actually got to meet one of the Real Housewives from New Iersey, Melissa Gorga, and I got to take a picture with her. I kind of fangirled over that a little bit, just because anyone who knows me, I'm always watching any of (the cast members), doesn't matter which one," Ross said. "I know she has a big platform, but she still knows how to utilize that and talk about her platform, and she knows how to pitch very well. You have to be able to pitch something, and you have to be able to perfect it, and she can do that."

Outside of the trade show, students visited various boutiques and did assignments various courses based their For observations. students example, in visual merchandising course paid attention to the displays and cleanliness of the stores, students in the readyto-wear clothing course took note of individual garments, their production and instructions. Students also had the opportunity to enjoy the city by shopping at local boutiques and having dinner at Gordon Ramsay Hell's Kitchen.


Although Ross had an interest

## MARTIN, WILLIS RECEIVE OUTSTANDING EMPLOYEE AWARDS

Ryan Martin and Dale Willis, both of Martin, received Spring 2022 Outstanding Employee Awards from UT Martin on April 6.

Martin is the assistant director for residence life and serves on various university committees to review campus policies and advocate for students and their families on campus. Martin also managed the transitions that the residence halls faced during the COVID-19 pandemic and worked to create clear lines of communication between his staff and students.

"Ryan cares about students, and he cares about UTM as a whole," coworkers wrote in Martin's nomination package. "He is an inspiring leader, even in the most turbulent times, always true to point out that a leader is only as strong as their team. Investing time and energy in each one, he helps staff and students flourish as individuals."

Martin is the second employee to be honored twice. He last received the Outstanding Employee Award in 2011.

Willis is the head technician in the Physical Plant's HVAC refrigeration shop. He maintains some of the largest commercial refrigeration equipment in the UT System and monitors and resolves issues for faculty and students alike.

"If you ask Dale why he works so hard at his job, he'll say he 'just doesn't want the kids to get hot,'" wrote his coworkers in his

in fashion and a drive to keep up with trends, fashion did not come to her as an immediate major choice. It wasn't until she found out about UT Martin's fashion merchandising program that she considered a career in fashion.

"I was just struggling so hard to figure out what I wanted to do for the rest of my life that wouldn't feel like a chore, and I wouldn't get tired of going to work," Ross said. "I saw that Martin had a fashion program, and I was like, 'This is perfect. I love what I'm gonna do. I will never get tired of it.' There's

something new every single day being invented in fashion that people don't even realize with fabrics or anything like that."

The trip was an opportunity for Ross to learn more about the industry she is passionate about and prepare for her future career in fashion forecasting. Fashion forecasters analyze popular forms of media, interior design and architecture to try to forecast what colors and styles will be on trend for the next year.

"Seeing (industry professionals) and the fashion forecasters and the other speakers talk, it just made me love fashion even more, and

it makes me so excited about graduating college and getting started into the industry," Ross said.

Because of the outcome of this year's trip, other yearly trips will be planned for students to travel regionally, nationally, and even internationally.

"I am a strong proponent of experiential learning, and travel aids the learning process," **Dr. Mercan Derafshi**, assistant professor of fashion merchandising and organizer of the trip, said.

#### You Tell Me

- Question Is trash and recycling collected from UT Martin offices sorted and recycled based on the Recycling Facility's list of taken items? I've often wondered based on trash collection if trash and recycle items were disposed and separated accordingly.
- •Answer Custodial Services currently does not enter offices, so building occupants are required to place their trash/recycle cans in the hallway. Custodial Services picks up all the small office trash cans and dumps them into one large mobile trash can that moves from floor to floor; the small recycle bins are emptied into a separate large container. The trash goes to a dumpster, and the recycle material goes to the Recycling Facility. It's possible that the bags are sometimes mixed up because the recycle material and trash are in the same-color bags and loaded into the same truck. Custodial Services' daily goal is to dump the trash and take recycle material to the Reycling Facility. The hope is to return to pre-COVID trash and recycling procedures.
