TENNESSEE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FULLY FUNDS UT MARTIN 'TEST HUB'

The proposed Tennessee Entrepreneurial Science and Technology (TEST) Hub at the University of Tennessee at Martin took a major step forward Thursday when the Tennessee General Assembly completely funded the \$18 million facility in a budget appropriations amendment. Once completed, the TEST Hub will provide hands-on manufacturing engineering education and a regional innovation hub that will support workforce and economic development for future generations. Sen. John Stevens (R-Huntingdon), Sen. Ken Yager (R-Kingston), House Majority Leader William Lamberth (R-Portland) and Rep. Tandy Darby (R-Greenfield) filed the budget item and advocated for the project. Stevens, Yager and Darby are UT Martin graduates.

The TEST Hub will be located on the west side of the UT Martin main campus and combine educational facilities, entrepreneurial centers and manufacturing workshops

surrounding a shared industrial maker space. Through partnership with the Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology and Dyersburg State Community College, the facility will offer educational opportunities at the certificate, associate and bachelor's degree levels, as well as career and technical education (CTE) opportunities for the region's high schools.

The concept for the facility was introduced in 2016 under then UT Martin interim chancellor **Dr. Bob Smith** and unveiled in a student-design project that was initially named The Garage. In a 2016 message in the university's Campus Scene alumni magazine, Smith wrote that the planned Latimer Engineering and Science Building, a \$65 million project made possible by a \$6.5 million gift from Union City's Bill Latimer now set to open in fall 2022, and the



UT Martin Commencement ceremonies set for May 6-7

UT Martin will hold spring commencement in three inperson ceremonies May 6-7 on the main campus in the Kathleen and Tom Elam Center. Commencement times are 6 p.m., May 6, and 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., May 7. Tickets are required to enter the Elam Center with social distancing requested. Doors will open 45 minutes before each ceremony begins.

Friday's ceremony will feature students receiving graduate degrees; the a.m. Saturday program will feature graduates from the colleges of education, health and behavioral sciences and humanities and fine arts; and the 2 p.m. Saturday ceremony will include graduates from the colleges of agriculture and applied sciences, business and global affairs, and engineering and natural sciences.

Each ceremony will be livestreamed at www. facebook.com/utmartin and www.youtube.com/utmartin. The ceremonies will archived for later viewing on YouTube and will also be broadcast live in Skyhawk Fieldhouse located adjacent to the Elam Center, which will allow additional guests to view the commencements. While tickets are required to enter the Elam Center, additional tickets will not be required to access Skyhawk Fieldhouse.

proposed Garage would become transformational projects for workforce development. "These new facilities will give our graduates a leg up on the competition with high-tech training and hands-on, real-world experience working with local industry leaders," he wrote.

Dr. Keith Carver became UT Martin chancellor in January 2017, and along with industry representatives, donors and UT System President Randy Boyd, continued to seek support for the project that was renamed the TEST Hub in June 2021. **Dr. Shadow Robinson**, UT Martin College of Engineering and Natural Sciences dean, wrote

about the project's significance in a letter to university supporters. "This project is not only a top educational priority for the University of Tennessee at Martin, but also a top priority for future economic and workforce development for the region we serve," he wrote.

In the same letter, Robinson explained the reasoning behind the new name.

"The (TEST Hub) captures the nature of the facility as one where the future economic andworkforce development partners with the educational offerings of a strong university," Robinson wrote. "Our marketing contacts are excited about this change and believe it will strengthen our ability to support industry recruitment into the region."

Funding for the TEST Hub comes at a key time for support of the Ford Motor Company's Blue Oval City development at the Memphis Regional Megasite. The \$5.6 billion dollar investment by Ford and SK Innovation was announced in September 2021 by Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee. The facility will produce the first all-electric F-Series trucks. The educational partnerships the TEST Hub will be crucial in supporting the university's existing industrial partners, such as Williams Sausage and Stanley Black & Decker, and the new Ford facility and suppliers it will bring to the region.

"The Tennessee General Assembly's funding of the TEST Hub adds a critical piece to UT Martin's role in Blue Oval City's future success. Along with the Latimer Engineering and Science Building, the university is positioned to be a major partner in a project that will change lives for the better in West Tennessee," Carver said. "We're grateful to members of the Senate and House across the state and to UT President Randy Boyd who share our vision for the region's future."

The TCED Program gives participants a broad-based knowledge of economic trends,

tools and core components required to compete in today's global economy.

"All of our Tennessee certified economic developers made a serious commitment to achieve this designation," said Kim Denton, director of the TCED Program. "They now will be able to use this in-depth knowledge to benefit their communities and regions."

New graduates will be invited to join the TCED Alumni Group, which provides continuing education and networking opportunities several times throughout the year.
