### Center provides grants for campus recycling initiatives

The UT Martin Center for Sustainability will award two Campus Sustainability Grants to campus organizations looking to improve the Recycling Facility and to expand the range of accessible recycling bins on campus.

The UT Martin chapter of Psi Chi Honor Society will receive \$4,000 to replace the current bins at the Recycling Facility, which will make the process of sorting recyclable materials safer and more efficient. UT Martin's College Panhellenic Council will receive \$1,500 to spend on setting up recycling bins in Sorority Village, which is the location for the university's sorority houses.

Campus Sustainability Grants are awarded yearly to the student group with the strongest proposal for a sustainability-related project on campus. Applications for next year's grants are due by March 1, 2023, and projects must be carried out during the 2023-2024 academic year. 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Drs. Brian Donavant, professor of criminal justice, and Cindy Boyles, associate professor of criminal justice, hosted de-escalation training for law enforcement officers, mental health first responders, Jackson Community College criminal justice students and community members March 21-25 at the UT Martin Lawrence D. Bromley Training Center in downtown Martin. The training is an outreach of the UT Martin Criminal Justice Program and is funded through a USDA Rural Health Services Grant focused on reducing injury



and mortality rates of citizenpolice encounters. The Bromley Training Center, a Town & Gown initiative between the university and the City of Martin, is housed in the former C.E. Weldon Public Library and named in honor of Senior Corporal Lawrence D. Bromley, a 1981 UT Martin Criminal lustice alumnus and Dallas, Texas, Police Department detective who was killed in the line of duty in 1991. Additional training sessions for similar groups are ongoing this week and will continue on a regular basis.

Dr. Cassie Burks, assistant professor of nursing, recently had an article accepted for publication titled, "Appreciative Advising to Enhance Academic Major Satisfaction in Nursing Students." The article outlines a research study completed at UT Martin where Dr. Burks implemented appreciative advising to empower students during proactive advising sessions. 

The Paul Meek Library will dedicate a display honoring its donors at 3 p.m., Tuesday, April 12. The library's brick campaign began in 1996 to acquire additional funding as renovations were completed on the building. In recognition of each gift, a brick paver was originally placed along the sidewalk outside the library with a personalized inscription. Over the years, the pavers and the location of the pavers began to deteriorate, making the area uneven and unsafe to walk. In 2017, the pavers were removed, and individual name plates were installed on one of the library's exterior walls. Recently, the decision was made to conclude 25-year campaign and

acknowledge the 200 donors with a permanent indoor display. More than \$40,000 was raised during the campaign, with the funds supporting collections, furnishings, services and engagement events of the Paul Meek Library.
