24th-Annual South Agricultural Finance Conference will be held from 8:30 a.m.- 2 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 10, in the Boling University Center's Watkins Auditorium. The conference, themed "Getting Comfortable the Uncomfortable," discusses strategies for taking advantage of opportunities during uncertain economic environments. Three Martin administrators have completed the University of Tennessee Executive Leadership Institute program. Dr. Nancy Buschhaus, of Palmersville, interim dean for the College of Engineering and Natural Sciences; Edie Gibson, of Martin, senior adviser to the chancellor; and Dr. Mark McCloud, of Martin, chief diversity and inclusion officer, were among 23 participants in the institute's 2022 class. This year's cohort is the third in the program's history.

Buschhaus has taught in **Continued on PAGE 2** the Department of Biological

Sciences for 25 years and was serving as department chair before being named interim dean in June. She previously served as undergraduate council chair for the UT Martin Faculty Senate and has participated in committee work associated with enrollment and faculty evaluation.

In addition to her role as senior advisor to the chancellor, Gibson serves as secretary to the UT Martin Advisory Board and is institutional compliance chair for the campus. During her 32-year UT Martin career, Gibson has overseen institutional research

and served as senior woman administrator for intercollegiate athletics.

McCloud was appointed chief diversity and inclusion officer in spring 2021 and previously served as the director for the Office of Career Planning and Development. McCloud also serves as the director of diversity and inclusion for the Southern Association for College and Employers and received the 2020 organization's Mosaic Award for his dedication to diversity and inclusion initiatives.

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After serving a year as president-elect, **Dr. Todd Winters**, dean of the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences, became president of the North American Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture (NACTA) at the group's national confrence in June.





ENTERS TENNESSEE SPORTS HALL OF FAME - Bettye Giles, pictured with Chancellor Keith Carver, was officially welcomed July 23 into the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame in Nashville. The induction event was held at the Omni Nashville Downtown Hotel and follows the 2020 announcement of her hall of fame membership. The induction event was delayed two years because of the pandemic, so the July 23 event included recognition of the 2020 and 2021 classes and the announcement of the 2022 class. Giles served as director of UT Martin women's athletics from 1969 until her retirement in 1994. Her leadership and activism coincided with the Title IX education amendments of 1972, which require federally funded educational institutions to provide fair and equal treatment in all areas of educational programming, including sports. Honored in the 2021 class was UT Martin graduate Brandon Rowland, of Jackson, a double amputee and accomplished athlete who led the Jackson Generals wheelchair basketball team to two National Wheelchair Basketball Association titles in the early 2000s. Art Sparks, also an alum and UT Martin Advisory Board chair, is a member of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame board of directors.



BLUE OVAL CITY TEAM MEETS - The Blue Oval City Response Team held its initial meeting Friday, July 22, in the Dunagan Alumni Center. The team was created to coordinate preparations for and responses to Ford information releases and requests for assistance. The team's goal is to connect UT Martin students, faculty, staff and programs with bold and innovative partnerships with the Megasite of West Tennessee. Ford Motor Company's first new manufacturing plant since the 1960s will change West Tennessee. But until the first all-electric F-Series trucks are manufactured in 2025, much work is ahead to prepare for Blue Oval City, the \$5.6 billion development announced in September 2021 by Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee. Ford and SK Innovation will build a 3.600-acre campus for the project that will create thousands of new jobs in the region. 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The institute is part of UT System President Emeritus Joe DiPietro's legacy and was established to prepare internal candidates for future leadership positions and complement current succession-planning efforts within the UT System.

The institute is led by Dr. Bob Smith, senior associate leadership and talent development to the UT president UT Martin chancellor emeritus. The institute offers participants coaching mentorship as well as experiential learning opportunities and access to online leadership courses to use toward creation of individualized development plans. This year's class met six times throughout the year for multi-day sessions.
