UTM, TCAT Northwest sign articulation agreement

Chancellor Yancy Freeman signed the agreement on behalf of UT Martin.

UT Martin signed an articulation agreement June 5 with the Tennessee College of Applied Technology Northwest that will enable more students in West Tennessee to pursue a degree through UT Martin.

A signing ceremony was held at TCAT Northwest's Bells Instructional Service Center in Crockett County.

Dr. Youlanda Jones, president of TCAT Northwest, told those in attendance that the agreement will mean a lot to students in the area.

"This articulation agreement will be invaluable for the growth and expansion for our farming operations technology and our digital agronomy programs," she said. "It will align perfectly with the UT Martin Bachelor of Science in agricultural business and Bachelor of Science in agriculture with a major in general agriculture."

UTM Chancellor **Yancy Freeman** detailed what the articulation agreement with TCAT Northwest means to area students.

"This new partnership between TCAT Northwest and UTM offers an exciting opportunity for eligible students," he said. "Upon successful completion of a farming operations technology or a digital agronomy program at TCAT Northwest, students can earn up to 30 credit hours (toward a UTM degree). These credits can be applied to UT Martin's main campus, at the UT Martin regional centers located in Jackson, Ripley and Somerville, and through UTM Online, providing students with a more flexible and efficient academic journey.

"The new articulation agreement provides students with a clear road map for their academic progress, reduces costs and offers students peace of mind that the transfer process is well-defined. Furthermore, the collaboration between our institutions provides students with a supportive network to enhance their success."

Read more UT Martin news at news.utm.edu! **Dr. Jason DeVito**, professor of mathematics and statistics, earned a second consecutive three-year award from the National Science Foundation that will go toward his study in how the universe is shaped.

The award totals \$136,007 and will help fund the project "RUI: Quotient Spaces and the Double-Soul Conjecture."

DeVito will receive two academic months of financial support during the summer term each year and will be funded for travel to the Joint Mathematics Meetings annually as well as the Workshop on Curvature and Global Shape in Germany and the United Kingdom each year.

DeVito earned a similar NSF award in 2021, which will expire on June 30, 2024.

The projects that DeVito earned both NSF awards for are based on Albert Einstein's Theory of Relativity, which predicts that the curvature of the universe is a four-dimensional shape called space-time that is determined by the matter and energy within it.

"From measurements physicists have done, it appears that, on average, our universe



is either flat (zero curvature) or slightly positively curved," DeVito stated in an email. "Here, positive curvature refers to something like the surface of a sphere. This leads to a math question that I am

interested in: What are all the four-dimensional shapes whose curvature is zero or positive?

"But there's a twist. Some versions of quantum mechanics suggest that our universe is actually 10-dimensional – others 13. That means to me that there's nothing special about the math question in four dimensions. So, what are all the shapes whose curvature is zero or positive?"

The current grant and the previous grant aim to help DeVito answer this question.

Juneteenth - a portmanteau of the words "June" and "nineteenth" is a holiday celebrated on June 19 to commemorate the emancipation of enslaved people. The holiday was first celebrated in Texas, where on that date in 1865, in the aftermath of the Civil War, enslaved people were declared free under the terms of the 1862 Emancipation Proclamation. The date became a federal holiday in 2021 and is one of only five date-specific federal holidays, including New Year's Day, Independence Day, Veterans Day and Christmas Day.


Pat Johnson, wife of the late Dr. Joe Johnson, longtime University of Tennessee administrator and president, died June 12 in Knoxville.



June Spirit Award winners announced

Norma Coalter, administrative assistant for the Office of University Relations; Barry Darnell, building services assistant in the Office of Housing: and Shannon Perry, director of student conduct and care in the Division of Student Affairs, each earned the June 2024 Skyhawk Spirit Award.

Created last January, these awards seek to recognize employee contributions and actions that go above and beyond their typical duties.

The Innovation Spirit Award seeks to recognize employees who achieve beyond the status quo who implement an idea, initiative, process or system that improves efficiencies or outcomes.

The \$250 Innovative Spirit Awards will be reviewed by the director of human resources for final approval and must include sufficient documentation of the employee contribution that warrants their nomination. The \$50 Spirit Awards also require a brief nomination statement about the contribution or action made by the nominated employee.

"Although he is a junior professor, (Farley) has been asked to undertake some very prestigious and important roles in his service to the College and UT Martin," said one letter of nomination. "In the short time he has been employed at the university, he

led a committee of faculty in writing and submitting report forms to secure a new building for the College of Business and Global Affairs, led the diversity and equity initiative for the college, worked with the student financial case study team to garner two national first-place wins in the last three years, authored a textbook on the principles of finance, accompanied students on trips to the Federal Reserves in St. Louis and New York and traveled to Siena, Italy, on a student-recruitment endeavor."

Another letter of nomination spoke highly of Coalter.

"Norma prepares and releases both the chancellor's honor roll and graduation lists to the news media," it stated. "Getting these names to the right places is a challenge, but she then takes the phone calls from students and family members for names that are omitted upon publication.

"Most calls are related to the chancellor's honor roll, and those who call are already upset or unhappy. In many cases, the person omitted was not eligible to be listed, but Norma never loses her composure as she explains the reason for omission to each person. If a mistake occurred, which is rare, she takes responsibility and offers to resubmit the name."

Another letter praised Darnell for his work.

"Barry was hired in February 2023 and... quickly learned his job responsibilities and performed them to a high level," it stated. "However, that didn't stop Barry from consistently looking for opportunities to help more. ... Just a few short months after beginning at UTM, we had a position open for a building supervisor. This position serves as a team lead and supervisor for custodians in a given building. Barry applied for and was hired into this position with a start date in early September. In the same way Barry quickly excelled as a custodian, he has done the same as a building supervisor. He works diligently to coordinate tasks for the Ellington custodians and communicates any needs promptly to his supervisor."

Yet another letter spoke well of Perry.

"Shannon's innovative approach involves fostering relationships with both community and campus partners to cultivate a supportive environment for students to seek help," it stated.

"For instance, 'Popcorn and Prevention in the Dorms' addresses substance abuse, alcohol and drug-related issues, while 'Goat Snuggles' offers anxiety-reducing activities during finals. These creative campaigns reflect Shannon's dedication to addressing student needs in a holistic, caring and impactful manner. Shannon's dedication extends beyond UT Martin students to also include faculty, staff and community members."
