

# Sargolzaei to speak in Phi Kappa Phi Faculty Lecture

Saman Dr. Sargolzaei, associate professor of engineering, will present the Fall Phi Kappa Phi Faculty Lecture at 6 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 26, in Room 206 of the Boling University Center.

His lecture will explore the ethical, legal and cultural conundrums attached research and technologies that affect the human brain.

Neuroethics is an emerging field that addresses implications of advancements neuroscience and neurotechnology.

Public and private efforts over the last decade have developed new tools to deepen understanding of the human brain, with technologies capable

of sensing, recording decoding brain signals.

Other research has sought to stimulate, modify and augment brain function.

"While current work has predominantly focused medical and therapeutic uses, there are already examples of

commercial technologies for wellness, behavior modification, education and gaming," Sargolzaei said.

Responsible development and use of neurotechnologies will require significant and collaboration among societal stakeholders, engineers, scientists, policymakers corporations.

Sargolzaei directs the Brain Autonomy and Resiliency Lab, where he leads interdisciplinary projects funded in areas such autonomous vehicles. virtual reality and agricultural cybersecurity.

His doctoral research Florida International University explored the role of brain networks in diagnosing evaluating neurological disorders such as epilepsy and Alzheimer's disease.

Other graduate and postdoctoral research has included the mapping of neural pathways, implantable assistive technologies and the effects of mild traumatic brain injury and concussion on brain networks.

The event is hosted by the Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi. The event is open to the public. Reservations are not required but may be made through UT Martin's Runway events page.



# Constitution Day program set for Sept. 17 at 4 p.m.

UTM Director of Public Safety Michael O'Neill and Defense Attorney and Weakley County Mayor Dale Hutcherson will be the guest speakers at the Student Government Association's Constitution Day Speaker Program.

The event will be held at 4 p.m. in Room 111 of the Boling University Center.

O'Neill and Hutcherson will speak on "Constitutional Rights and Law Enforcement Interactions" from the perspectives of law enforcement and a criminal defense attorney.

The U.S. Constitution was drafted and signed by delegates to the Constitutional Convention on Sept. 17, 1787, in Philadelphia.

It would be made official on June 21, 1788, when New Hampshire became the ninth of the 13 states (more than two-thirds) to ratify it.

- Question What is the status of the Hall-Moody Administration Building upgrade? What is the completion date?
- Answer The Administration Building project is going according to schedule and should reach a completion for Phase 1 early in 2025. Phase 2 should follow right behind it possibly at the same time and the hope is to have that completed in time to move the occupants back in by fall 2025. Phase 1 includes all of the building except for the east end of the first and second floors, which are involved with Phase 2. The project will replace all of the mechanical, electrical, plumbing, fire alarm and data for the entire building. Two restrooms were added to enable each floor to have men's and women's facilities.


**Dr.** Nathan Howard, professor of history, presented a paper Aug. 8 at the 19th Oxford International Conference on Patristic Studies, a gathering of leading scholars on early Christian studies.


Howard's paper was titled "Managing Manhood: Gender and Performance in the Cappadocians' Letters."

Howard discussed how fourth-century bishops used letter writing to establish identities as Christian leaders according to classical Greek ideals of manhood.

The presentation was based on Howard's 2022 book "Christianity and the Contest for Manhood in Late Antiquity," published by Cambridge University Press.
