Tucker named assistant vice chancellor for enrollment

Director of Undergraduate Admissions Destin Tucker has been promoted to assistant vice chancellor for enrollment services and will serve as the university's chief enrollment officer.

In her new role, Tucker will oversee admissions, financial aid, records and the Student Success Center. She will begin her new responsibilities immediately.

"Destin has been instrumental in driving significant growth in enrollment, increasing the number of students from 6,705 at the start of her tenure in Juy 2016 to what this fall will likely be the largest enrollment in more than 10 years," said Dr. Philip Acree Cavalier, senior vice chancellor for academic

affairs. "Her leadership has also streamlined university operations by bringing critical services, including admissions name buys, communication flow to prospective students and back-office support inhouse.

"This strategic move has resulted in a \$275,000 reduction in expenses previously incurred through third-party contracts."

Since 2022, Tucker has chaired the Strategic Enrollment

Committee and will lead the development of the next strategic enrollment plan in the coming months.

She is leading the work of increasing international student enrollment to 5% of the total student body by 2030.

Dr. Anthony Delmond, associate professor of agricultural economics; Heidi Busch, assistant professor of library sciences; and former UTM faculty librarian Erin Weber (currently at Salisbury University in Maryland) wrote a co-authored article published Sept. 4 in the Journal of Academic Librarianship.

This paper was the culmination of a project that

began with the Faculty Learning Community in spring 2020. It was a cross-disciplinary study looking at the impacts of generalized information literacy instruction.

The authors had feedback from several instructors as they developed the survey tools, and a handful of UTM faculty members allowed the authors to use their classes for the project. The goal was to see whether

instruction resulted in general improvements or if existing disparities were broadened.

It was found that a rising tide raised all ships, but that extant disparities were exacerbated through the training. The results indicated that discipline-specific information literacy instruction might provide an important next step in improving students' knowledge and use of information in academics. **Dr. David Taylor**, adjunct faculty member in the College of Business and Global Affairs, and **Dr. Sean Walker**, professor of management, were featured recently with comments about separate topics in WalletHub.

Taylor was featured in WalletHub's piece about <u>Best</u> <u>Credit Cards for Bad Credit</u>, while Walker was featured in WalletHub's article about <u>Best Cities for Hispanic</u> <u>Entrepreneurs</u>.

WalletHub, based in Washington, D.C., is a financial website that offers practical information for consumers such as credit-improvement advice and personalized savings alerts.

The site's business-related features are supplemented with information from subjectmatter experts.

Wilson to speak about use of AI tools

Dr. Alisa Wilson, assistant professor in the Department of Educational Studies, will share research into the use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools at a public event at 4 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 10, in the Paul Meek Library.

The event is the first in the Fall 2024 UT Martin Research Series monthly speakers' program.

Wilson's presentation will share survey data collected from UT Martin faculty and staff about their use of ChatGPT.

This AI tool allows users to enter prompts into an online interface to easily produce essays of any desired length, format, style and level of detail.

"There is a great deal of misinformation and speculation about the use of artificial intelligence (AI) software in educational settings," she said. "My hope is that educators and students in the K-12 and postsecondary settings, will consider ways to harness these new tools to improve both

teacher pedagogy and student learning."

Wilson spent 18 years as a secondary level special education, inclusion and intervention teacher before joining higher education as an assistant professor of education.

She holds a master's degree in instruction, curriculum and leadership; a graduate certificate in educational technology;

additional graduate studies in special education; and a doctorate in educational leadership.
