# **UT Martin rises in the collegiate rankings**

UT Martin rose seven spots from last year in the Regional Universities-South category in the 2025 U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges rankings.

The university went from 27th last year to a tie for 20th place in the new rankings that included 135 regional southern universities.

Universities are ranked by U.S. News based on their performance across a set of widely accepted indicators of excellence.

In other U.S. News rankings in the Regional Universities-South category, UT Martin was tied for eighth in Top Public Schools and seventh in the Best Colleges for Veterans.

The university finished alone in 24th place in the Best Value Schools category.

"Rankings are one way to measure the quality of higher education institutions, and I'm pleased that UT Martin has improved in several categories in the latest U.S. News rankings," said **Dr. Yancy Freeman**, university chancellor. "Our successful fall enrollment shows that more people are looking to UT Martin to deliver the best educational experience possible."

In the online programs category, UT Martin tied for 51st place nationally in Best Online MBA Programs, tied for 63rd in best Online Master's in Criminal Justice Programs, and tied for 170th in Best Online Master's in Education Programs.

According to U.S. News, more than 1,800 online programs were surveyed to determine the latest rankings.

These rankings follow the August announcement that UT Martin is listed as a Best Regional College by The Princeton Review for the 22nd year.

UT Martin's fall enrollment reached 7,507 students, the highest enrollment at the university since 2012. This compares to 6,950 students who registered in fall 2023, which is an 8% increase. The freshman class totaled 1,220 students, up from 1,118 first-year students who enrolled in fall 2023.

UT Martin is a primary regional campus in the University of Tennessee System offering bachelor's degrees, majors, concentrations and options in more than 150 specialized fields as well as eight graduate degrees. In addition to the main campus, the university has six regional centers in Jackson, Parsons, Selmer, Ripley, Somerville and Springfield. UTMartin Online offers both undergraduate and graduate degrees, including the online Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies degree for working adults.

## highlighting the excellence of our faculty and staff

Dr. Daniel Nappo, professor of Spanish, went to Overton High School in Memphis on Sept. 24 and delivered a presentation about Hispanic Heritage Month, which runs from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15.

Nappo was invited by the staff at Overton to come and give the presentation.

The presentation was called "Las superpoderosas hispañas," and it was about the Spanish-American independence movements (many of which started in the fall of 1810), important women writers and academics, and Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz, Mexico's greatest poet.

Dr. Violet Bumah, an assistant professor in the Department of Chemistry and Physics, and three students - senior Lauren Milam, a chemistry major from Waynesboro; senior DeJa Graves, a chemistry major from Martin; and senior Xavier Jimenez, a chemistry major from McKenzie (photo right) - attended and presented four abstracts at Photobiomodulation the (PBM2024) Conference Aug. 23-25 in London, United Kingdom.

The PBM2024 conference was organized by the World Association for Photobiomodulation Therapy (WALT), which is one of the leading organizations in the field of light therapy.

Photobiomodulation is the use of light to modulate biological processes.

The titles of the four presentations were:

• "PBM for Reducing Infection: The Role of PBM in Microbial Inactivation, Invasion, and Infection," presented by Bumah.

- "The Effect of Pulsed Blue Light on Commensal Microflora," presented by Milam.
- "Pulsed Blue Light Inactivates Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)," presented by Graves.
- "The Effect of Pulsed Blue Light on Fibroblasts and Lung Cells," presented by Jimenez.

Milam and Jiminez were among the 10 student awards selected from 180 abstracts.

The trip to London was made possible by scholarships from the College of Engineering and Natural Sciences and the Department of Chemistry.

# Young Writers Conference scheduled for Nov. 7

The 2024 Young Writers Conference will take place Thursday, Nov. 7, on the main campus of UT Martin.

Designed primarily for students in grades 9-12, the conference offers a series of writing workshops taught by UT Martin faculty and visiting writers.

Students can attend hands-on workshops in writing poetry, fiction and nonfiction, as well as songwriting, literary analysis and professional story of self.

Other events include a luncheon, a keynote address by award-winning journalist and humor columnist Kelly Kazek, and an open mic reading for students.

Students will have an opportunity to read works created during the conference or other original writing created at home or in school. Throughout the day, students will create pieces of writing, connect with other young writers from the region and learn from outstanding writers and teachers of writing.

The conference is sponsored by the UT Martin Department of English and Modern Foreign Languages with help from the West Tennessee Writing Project.

The conference fee is \$10 for students and free for teachers; it includes all workshops, readings and lunch.

The conference is open to outstanding students recommended by their teachers on the basis of academic achievement and artistic promise.

Teachers may attend the student workshops along with their students.

It is recommended that teachers follow their school's policies in arranging for parent/guardian permissions for students who will be attending the conference.

Registration forms must be received by Friday, Oct. 25, along with payment for the conference registration fee.
