Pushing through the 'Dogs for a homecoming TD



UT Martin quarterback Kinkead Dent pushes his way through the Gardner-Webb defense to score a touchdown for the Skyhawks on a four-yard run in the third quarter. UTM beat the Bulldogs 35-17 in the annual homecoming game Saturday in a Big South-OVC Football Association matchup after taking a commanding 35-3 lead after three quarters. Dent accounted for 240 of the Skyhawks' 402 offensive yards in the game with 167 yards passing and 73 yards rushing, passing for one touchdown and running for another. Patrick Smith had a game-high 128 rushing yards and scored UT Martin's other three touchdowns. Tyler Dostin pulled in a 55-yard TD pass from Dent in the second quarter and finished with 66 receiving yards.

UTM receives \$745K agriculture education grant

U.S. Rep. David Kustoff (R-Tenn.) recently helped secure a U.S. Department of Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) Capacity Building Grant for Non-Land-Grant Colleges of Agriculture worth \$745,000 for the University of Tennessee at Martin.

"The research and outreach provided by this federal funding will positively affect the UT Martin campus, Weakley County Schools and West Tennessee as well as the service area of our Innov8Africa partner for years," said **Chancellor Yancy Freeman**. "The quality of this project is confirmed by the fact that NIFA requested an increase in scope of the project with an additional \$50,000 added to the original budget request."

Kustoff secured the funding by leading a letter to the House Committee on Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration and related agencies sent on March 24, 2023.

The Capacity Building Grants for Non-land-grant Colleges of Agriculture (NLGCA) Program assists NLGCA-certified institutions in maintaining and expanding their capacity to conduct education, research, outreach/extension and integrated activities relating to agriculture, renewable resources and similar disciplines.

UTM students travel-study to California



Nine UTM students led by Dr. Stan Dunagan, Dr. Angie Van Boening and Allison Bohanon participated in a travel study that consisted of attending the Geological Society of America annual meeting in Anaheim, California, followed by a four-day geological tour through Southern California. The students got to experience a professional conference where geologists from across the U.S. and around the world gathered to present their research. After the conference, the group drove down the coast to Crystal Cove State Park and then inland toward the Salton Sea. They then traveled north through Joshua Tree and Death Valley national parks, where they learned about the geology, ecology and history of the parks before returning to Martin. The students each gave a "site talk" over a topic of their choosing in fulfillment of their coursework for GEOL 475.
