

They toured real rockets, including the Saturn V, learned about space missions and the International Space Station, and had the chance to experience astronaut-style simulations. Also, they enjoyed an INTUITIVE Planetarium "James Webb Space Telescope: The Story Unfolds" show about the most powerful telescope ever built and witnessed the evolution of galaxies, the life cycle of stars and distant worlds. You Tell Me

- Question As the work continues in the Hall-Moody Administration Building, the building's office lights usually remain burning overnight. What's the reason for the lights being on when the building isn't occupied, and no workers are present?
- Answer The contractor has control of the building, and the lighting is on temporary circuits to provide safe entry and exit. There is not an easy way to isolate the circuitry while on temporary power. The contractor is required to meet Occupational Safety and Health Administration requirements for safety, so sufficient lighting is part of compliance. Progress continues and the building is projected for completion and occupancy in early fall 2025.
