# Springfield Center officially approved by SACSCOC

The UT Martin Springfield Regional Center was approved in February by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, or SACSCOC.

This officially gives UT Martin six regional centers, with Springfield joining regional centers in Jackson, McNairy County/Selmer, Parsons, Ripley and Somerville.

The Tennessee Higher Education Commission voted for approval of the UT Martin Springfield Regional Center last year on May 22. This center is housed on the Volunteer State Community College-Springfield campus.

The addition of this regional center comes

after a successful partnership between Vol State-Springfield and UT Martin. In November 2023, the campuses entered an agreement that allowed students to pursue post-secondary education in agriculture, education, health care and technology sectors onsite.

"We are providing agriculture business, farm and ranch management and the Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies degree at the Springfield Center," said Erica Bell, executive director of the Office of Regional Centers and Online Programs.

"We also have a dual-enrollment partnership that began with Robertson County Schools last fall. That allows students who are interested in ag business or farm and ranch management to start their general education curriculum at Vol State and their concentration degree-specific courses with UT Martin."

Bell added that students enrolled in dual-enrollment courses through Vol State could complete the remaining year of those general-education courses the year after they graduate high school and then move on to degree-specific courses through UT Martin.

"Basically, it cuts off an entire year," she said. "In three years, they can walk away with a Bachelor of Science degree from UT Martin without ever leaving Robertson



## Students attend TBA Credit Conference in Nashville

College of Business and Global Affairs students, faculty and staff attended the 2025 Tennessee Bankers Association Credit Conference on March 6 in Nashville.

The TBA Credit Conference involves more than 600 loan officers, loan support personnel and executive-level managers as well as college students from Tennessee universities.

Fifteen students from the UTM College of Business and

Global Affairs were sponsored by nine banks to attend the conference, learn about the credit and lending industry and engage in networking opportunities.

Sponsoring banks include Bank of Milan, Centennial Bank, Commercial Bank & Trust, First Bank, First Citizens, First Farmers & Merchants, Greenfield Banking Company, Security Bank and Simmons Bank. Additionally, eight of the 15 students attended to meet scholarship requirements for scholarships funded by First Farmers & Merchants, Centennial Bank, Security Bank & Trust and Commercial Bank & Trust.

After attending industry sessions and hearing an inspiring talk from former U.S. Army veteran and Afghan prisoner of war Jessica Lynch,

the students ended the day with two leadership sessions centered around professional development and making industry connections.

John Clark, director of the Dunagan Banking Chair of Excellence; Dr. Brittany Cole, assistant professor of finance; and Traci Crawford, director of the Mid-South Agricultural Finance Conference, attended the conference with the students.

Brendan O'Bryan, a senior veterinary science major from Murfreesboro, presented his University Scholars project, "All Costs (and Creatures) Great and Small: Price Sensitivity and Livestock Production," at the Southern Agriculture Economics Association annual meeting on Feb. 3.

Dr. Jason Roberts, professor

of animal science, and **Dr. Brittany Cole**, assistant professor of finance, serve as faculty mentors on the project.

The project uses a livestock producer's survey to gauge price sensitivity to veterinary care expenses. Despite the increasing costs and scarcity of large animal service providers, livestock producers are not sensitive to

veterinary care prices.

Livestock producers frequently use veterinary care, with 82% of respondents reporting they used a veterinarian in the most recent three months.

Most producers (91%) have long-term relationships with their veterinarians, admit the emergencies strain the budget more than routine care and feel veterinary care is priced fairly.

Even though the livestock producers surveyed feel they are sensitive to herd health care pricing, a majority admit to a willingness to pay whatever price veterinarians deem fair in emergency situations.

In fact, 91% report they feel financially prepared to cover all emergency veterinary expenses.

# Students take geomorphology trip to northern Alabama



Students in the geomorphology class (GEOL 355) taught by Dr. Stan Dunagan, professor of geology, spent the weekend of Feb. 28-March 2 exploring 2.3 miles of Tumbling Rock Cave in northern Alabama for more than five hours and saw stalagmites, stalactites, columns, a 400-foot dome, salamanders, cave crickets, bats, huge rooms with significant breakdown, underground streams and the remnants of Civil War saltpeter excavations. They also explored the Cumberland Plateau and examined karst and fluvial landforms. Shown at left are (I-r) Angus McCoy, Breylan Hedgecoth and Brooke Parker; navigating a large breakdown pile. The rodeo will be held April 17-19 at the Ned McWherter Agricutural Complex. An exclusive link to purchase tickets can be found at this site. The action will begin at 7:30 p.m. each night. All tickets are reserved seating, as the price is \$12 on Thursday and \$20 for each of the Friday and Saturday sessions. Children age 5 and under get in free, but must sit in an adult's lap. Due to increasingly high demand, fans are encouraged to buy tickets early, as sellout crowds are once again anticipated. There is a sixseat limit for each nightly session per login. For the fifth consecutive year, the performance rounds of each session will be streamed live online for \$10 per night. Streaming access can also be purchased at the ticket link above. The UT Martin Spring College Rodeo is annually considered one of the largest-attended events on campus and has consistently been named the "Rodeo of the Year" in the Ozark Region.


# **UT President Boyd attends Generosity and Gratitude celebration**

County."

UT Martin is also working in partnership with the University of Tennessee Highland Rim Ag Research and Education Center in Springfield.

Dr. Wendi Tostenson (pronounced "TOSS-ten-son"), president of Volunteer State Community College, said the addition of UT Martin is a boon for people in and around Robertson County who want to earn a four-year degree.

"It's all at Vol State, so I think the addition of the UT Martin courses and having the availability of a four-year degree at the Springfield Center is a game-changer for Vol State and the community," she said. "The partnership provides our students with seamless pathways to continue their education from dual enrollment to an associate's degree to a four-year bachelor's degree, and they don't have to leave the region. That's really important.

"This partnership directly addresses the workforce needs in our area and it provides educational offerings at home, which make that very appealing to our Springfield and Robertson County students and, really, for all of Vol State. We have students on the Gallatin campus who could then transfer and continue to take

those courses at the Springfield campus because of the proximity of those locations."

Tostenson added that UT Martin's dual-enrollment agreement with Robertson County Schools is another asset for the Springfield Center.

"Our dual-enrollment students finish high school in Robertson County, they have a clear pathway with Vol State and then, with UT Martin and the Springfield Center specifically. those students are able to get an associate's degree and transfer seamlessly," she said. "And, there's not that fear in the transferability. Often, students who get an associate's degree and seek a four-year degree have some concern when they try to navigate a new system, a new school, a new process.

"I believe that the work we've done with UT Martin provides that stability for those students, where they don't have to be concerned or scared. They just know that they're taking the next class. Any time that we can make pathways in education easier to navigate and maneuver, the better it is for our students. By keeping students local, we not only support their academic and career goals but also strengthen the workforce pipeline Robertson County, ensuring that our region continues to grow and thrive."



Tostenson said that the agreement with UT Martin and Vol State goes beyond an educational opportunity.

"For the Springfield Center, this expansion strengthens its role as a higher education hub in Robertson County," she said. "It will attract more students, increase engagement with local businesses and industries and support regional economic growth by developing a more skilled workforce."
