Annual UTM Spring College Rodeo set for April 17-19

The 57th annual UT Martin Spring College Rodeo is set for Thursday, April 17, through Saturday, April 19, at the Ned McWherter Agricultural Complex.

Doors will open at 6 p.m. each night, and the performance rounds will start at 7:30 p.m.

Annually recognized as one of the biggest events on campus, the UT Martin Spring College Rodeo includes timed events and rough stock events (including bull riding) each night. The Skyhawk men's and women's teams will compete against fellow Ozark Region National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) members in one of the final regular season outings before the 77th annual College National Finals Rodeo, which is scheduled for June 15-21 in Casper, Wyoming.

Wendell Alexander Realty, Top Tier Auctions and the Tennessee Department of Agriculture are sponsoring a shrimp boil on Wednesday, April 16, at 5:30 p.m. Hosted by the UT Martin Rodeo Booster Club, the event is open to the public. The cost is \$25 per plate (hamburgers and hot dogs will also be served) at the American Legion Post 55 building at 221 Central St. in Martin.

The 57th annual UT Martin Spring College Rodeo officially begins on Thursday with Tyson, Obion County Complex sponsoring the performance round. Day 2 of the event will take place on Friday, as that performance round is sponsored by Tennessee Tractor LLC.

Brown served as director of the event. Ethics Bowl matches feature two teams discussing difficult ethical questions, developing arguments in defense of answers to those questions, and responding to comments from judges and other teams.

Nine teams competed in this year's competition, including teams from Westview High School, Union City High School, Dresden High School, employers find value in using internships to identify future hires, accomplish project-driven tasks, and train lower- to middlelevel managers in employee supervision. Some 91% of employers

report that including interns in the company culture increases workplace collegiality and positivity.

Overall, the results provide a good initial picture of the role internships play for employers and students.

UTM Piano Ensemble to perform spring program April 17

The UT Martin Piano Ensemble program will take place at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, April 17, in the Blankenship Recital Hall in the Fine Arts Building.

The ensemble is dedicating its spring 2025 program to the memory of Dr. Allison Nelson Neal Loebbaka (1927-2025). She was professor emeritus of music and the founder of UTM's Piano Ensemble over 50 years ago.

Dr. Elaine Harriss, professor of music, is the director of the Piano Ensemble. She will retire at the end of the school year after more than 50 years of piano instruction and 24 years at UT Martin.

The unusual apsect for this program will be the large groups of pianists performing at one time. It will include three pieces scored for two pianos eight hands: Bedrich Smetana's classic "Rondo," Camille Saint-Saens exciting "Danse Macabre," and William Gillock's delightful "Champagne Toccata."

In addition, the group will perform Arthur Frackenpohl's "Intro and Rag" written for four pianos, 16 hands.

This last piece is made possible by the former Community Concert Association of Union City and Obion County which recently gifted its nine-foot Steinway grand piano to the UTM Department of Music,

Cybersecurity students take part in hands-on project

Students in CYBR 352 – Secure Software Development – partnered April 8 with the university's Information Technology Services (ITS) team for a hands-on servicelearning project focused on cybersecurity awareness and phishing resilience.

ITS leads Olivia Fernandez, director of ITS, and Brian Stubblefield, IT security administrator, guided students through the process of designing, conducting, and analyzing phishing simulations used in the university's spring campaign.

CYBR 352, taught by **Dr. Lily Pharris**, assistant professor of computer science, introduces students to design principles and practices for secure software development.

By the end of the course, students are equipped to handle vulnerabilities, design for security, implement protections, test for weaknesses and maintain security in deployed software – skills that aligned with the goals of this campus-wide simulation project.

As part of their service-learning component of the course, students in the course completed five hours of outside work, which included developing realistic phishing scenarios.

After a competitive internal review, two simulations – created by Blanca Negrete, a senior majoring in computer science, and Daniel Way, a senior majoring in cybersecurity – were selected and implemented during the university's spring phishing campaign, part of UTM's quarterly security awareness initiative.

The results were eye-opening:

• Campaign 1, a credential harvesting phishing attack sent to 198 recipients, saw a 73.2% open rate, with 11.1% compromised.

• Campaign 2, a malicious attachment phishing attack sent to 99 recipients, resulted in a 66.7% open rate, but a significantly higher 25.3% compromise rate, along with

15.2% replies and only 11.1% reporting.

"Working with the students gave them the chance to apply what they've learned in a real-world context, and it was clear how much they grew through the process," Fernandez said. "They gained a better understanding of how users respond to threats, how to think critically about security awareness and how their work can directly impact an organization. Watching them connect the dots between theory and practice was incredibly rewarding."

"This kind of partnership is incredibly valuable for everyone involved," said Pharris. "It allows students to move beyond the classroom to gain hands-on experience that builds their confidence, sharpens their skills and adds meaningful work to their resumes. They not only leave with technical knowledge but also with real-world insights and a compelling story to tell as they launch their careers."

Alumnus speaks at annual Honors Day program

Nicholas Glenn, the regional executive director of Law Enforcement Against Drugs and Violence (LEAD) Inc., and a 2005 graduate of UT Martin was the guest speaker at the university's annual Honors Day program April 13.

Glenn has also been the team chaplain for the UT Martin football team since 2008.

The program honored several students and faculty for their achievements during

the 2024-25 school year.

Glenn spoke about how people behave at an airport can correlate with behavior in life.

"When you start off that journey or that brand-new job that you get, remember that it's OK to wait in line if you're in the right line," he said. "When you get to that new job or that new place or that new opportunity, whatever it may be, keep in mind that somebody was there before you. There is somebody working at that place who has some knowledge that can be passed on to you, knowledge that can be shared with you.

"It's OK to wait in line behind some individuals who have already gone before you. From time to time, you get caught up and want to be in the front of the line, and we don't take the time to learn the lessons **Continued on PAGE 6**

that we can pick up while we are waiting in the line."

Glenn added that we need to note how we treat people while getting on the plane – and taking off in life.

"Sometimes, in airports, it's hard to eat, and you may have a tight connection," he said. "So, you get your food and you take your food on the plane with you.

"There is something that I'd like you to keep in mind when you sit next to me on an airplane: Not everyone enjoys the smell of onions and anchovies. So, when you're bringing your meal onto the plane, be considerate of the people around you. Maybe they don't want to smell that particular meal."

Glenn said that it is OK to take care of your career and make decisions about yourself.

"But do not burn up the people around you," he said. "Don't put your family out; don't put your family down; don't put all your friends down. Don't treat people rude just to make what you feel is right."

Among those honored at the ceremony were University Scholars, Phi Kappa Phi initiates, Who's Who honorees and Department of the Army superior cadets.
