Faculty, staff members named to President's Award

Four faculty and staff members from UT Martin were named to the 2025 President's Awards, as announced at the UT System Board of Trustees meeting July 1 at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

UT Chattanooga received three of the 17 President's Awards, while the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, the University of Tennessee Institute for Public Service, University of Tennessee Southern and University of Tennessee Health Science Center each received two.

President's Awards were presented in seven categories, with a faculty member and a staff member each receiving an award in each category (some categories had more than one faculty member or staff member).

Award winners were announced by UT System President Randy Boyd.

The UT President's Awards program recognizes outstanding contributions of faculty and staff centered around the UT System's "Be One UT" values. Honorees are selected each year from a systemwide pool of candidates nominated by campus and institute leaders.

Commemorative and monetary awards are presented during an annual ceremony, and faculty and staff winners help select honorees in future years. The awards ceremony luncheon will be held in August.

Dr. Curtis Kunkel, professor of mathematics and statistics. presented "Positive Solutions Singular Second-Order Value **Problems** Boundary on Time Scales" during the American Mathematical Society's Special Session on Theoretical. Applied Numerical Aspects of Nonlinear PDEs III.

The special session was held at the 2025 Spring Central Sectional Meeting held at the University of Kansas on March 30.

Kunkel's research, conducted

in collaboration with Dr. Shalmali Bandyopadhyay, assistant professor mathematics and statistics. addresses complex mathematical problems involving singular second-order boundary value problems with mixed boundary conditions on general time scales, proving the existence of positive solutions through a combination of lower and upper solutions method and the Brouwer fixed-point theorem, along with perturbation methods used to approximate regular problems.

The book features a new prologue by Professor Guillermo Laín Corona of the National University of Distance



Education (Universidad Nacional de Educación a Distancia, or UNED). The prologue was supported by a grant called Provecto PoeMAS.

"My translation received generous support from the Colectivo Peor para el Sol de Úbeda," Nappo said in an email. "Peor para el Sol is a group of Sabina's admirers, most of whom are from his hometown of Úbeda, Spain, who promote music and poetry. The collective is directed by Sabina's cousin, Juan José Gordillo."

Dr. Chanrui "Charlie" Liu, assistant professor of statistics, co-authored an article June 26 in The Journal of Alzheimer's Disease.

"Estimation of events in cohort studies based on probability of cognitive impairment" was co-written by eight authors, including Liu.

The objective of the research was to use readily available basic predictors to generate cumulative incidence functions for serious cognitive impairments over years of follow-up.

The co-authors estimated that when two or more risk

factors are present, the longterm incidence of clinical mild cognitive impairment and dementia is 2.3 to 2.7 times higher than that of the zero-risk group for both sexes.

This come-and-go summer day camp for faculty and staff features lemon jousting, human


Hungry Hippo game, arts and crafts, indoor lawn games and, yes, s'mores.
