Boyd, UT ag commission visit UTM campus

UTM among regional top 20 in U.S. News rankings

UT Martin has again earned a spot in the Regional Universities South category of the 2026 U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges rankings, which were released Sept. 23.

The university is tied for the second year at 20th place in the new rankings, which include 135 regional southern universities.

Colleges and universities are evaluated according to 17 ranking factors, including graduation, retention and post-graduation earning rates.

In other U.S. News rankings in the Regional Universities South category, UT Martin is tied for ninth place in the Top Public Schools ranking and is tied for eighth place in the Best Colleges for Veterans ranking. UT Martin ranked alone in 21st place in the Best Value Schools category ranking.

"We're pleased that UT Martin remains one of the top regional and public-regional universities in the South," said **Dr. Yancy Freeman**, university chancellor. "Rankings tell only part of the story for any college or university, but prospective students and their families sometimes use rankings as one measure of quality. UT Martin remains an excellent value among higher-education institutions."

In the online programs category, UT Martin tied for 46th place in Best Online MBA Programs, tied for 28th place in Best Online MBA Programs for Veterans, tied for 64th place in Best Online Master's in

OSCC raises emergency aid awareness

This year, the UT Martin Office of Student Conduct and Care (OSCC) made significant strides in combating the opioid crisis through education, training and the distribution of lifesaving overdose reversal medications.

Over the course of seven days during the last week of August, OSCC provided training to 1,200 students, faculty and staff on recognizing the signs of an overdose and how to properly administer Naloxone (Narcan).

During this time, OSCC also distributed more than 1,200 boxes of Naloxone to students, faculty and staff. These efforts were made possible through a generous partnership with the Coalition for Healthy and Safe Campus Communities (CHASCo).

In recognition of International Overdose Awareness Day (Aug. 31), OSCC partnered with Student Health and Counseling Services (SHCS), the Weakley County Health Department and the Weakley County Prevention Coalition (WCPC) on Aug. 29 to distribute more 300 comprehensive overdose prevention kits which included Fentanyl test strips - during a campus tabling event and SHCS's Taxi Trivia program.

These events helped ensure that individuals at risk or those close to someone at risk had the tools needed to respond and potentially save a life.

As of last January, UT Martin equipped Automated External



Defibrillator (AED) stations on campus with Naloxone. Now, every AED location across the main campus and regional centers includes clearly-labeled Naloxone for emergency use and distribution.

Additionally, Naloxone is available on the resource table outside the OSCC office and in the OSCC office itself on the second floor of the Boling University Center.

This initiative was launched through a collaboration between OSCC, CHASCo, WCPC and the UTM Office of Environmental Health and Safety. The shared goal is to make lifesaving medication easily and immediately accessible to anyone in need.

OSCC and WCPC ensured that clear instructions and quick training were provided during the distribution of Naloxone and overdose kits. Tennessee's Good Samaritan Law protects individuals who administer Naloxone in good faith. The medication is safe to use even if a person is not actively overdosing, and incorrect administration does not harm the individual. This legal protection encourages the UTM community to act without fear in emergency situations.

If someone notices that Naloxone is missing or expired at a campus AED station, they should report it by calling the OSCC at 731-881-7703 or emailing utmcareteam@utm.edu. AED stations are inspected and restocked monthly to ensure readiness.


PML to showcase services, programs

Criminal Justice Programs, and tied for 180th place in Best Online Master's in Education Programs. More than 1,800 online programs were surveyed by U.S. News.

These rankings follow an August announcement that UT Martin was listed as a Best Regional College by The Princeton Review for the 23rd year in a row. The university was also named earlier this year as a 2025-2026 Military Friendly School by Viqtory.

UT Martin tied its secondhighest fall enrollment total in history as 8,101 students are enrolled for the fall 2025 semester at its main campus and six regional centers in Jackson, Parsons, Ripley, Selmer, Somerville and Springfield in Middle Tennessee.

UT Martin is a primary regional campus in the University of Tennessee System offering 23 undergraduate degree programs that include 142 specialized concentrations and eight graduate degrees featuring 30 specialized

concentrations.

In addition to the main campus and six regional centers, UT Martin Online offers both undergraduate and graduate degrees, including the online Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies degree for working adults. Learn more at www.utm.edu.
