UTM, UT Extension to sponsor ag workshop

The 2025 growing season marks yet another challenging year for Tennessee's row crop production, with high input costs, low commodity prices and drought impacting overall profitability.

To assist farmers with financial management, University of Tennessee Extension and UT Martin are partnering to offer "Financing Your Operation in 2026: West Tennessee Row Crop Workshop."

This free educational program is open to

the public and will be held twice on Dec. 1. The first session is scheduled from 8 to 11 a.m. in the Champions Club of Hardy M. Graham Stadium. It will be held again from 5 to 8 p.m. at the West Tennessee AgResearch and Education Center in Jackson at 605 Airways Blvd.

Applicable strategies and timely information on a variety of farm financial topics will be covered, including:

Vendor financing

- Debt carryover
- Consolidating loans
- Share and cash rental agreements
- Machinery costs and values
- Seed, fertilizer and chemical prices
- Selecting crop insurance

"Challenges within the row crop industry have resulted in substantial monetary losses in consecutive years for many corn, cotton, soybean and wheat farmers," said Aaron

Deadline to apply for ORSP funding is Nov. 1

The Office of Research and Sponsored Programs (ORSP) provides funding for internal awards designed to assist UTM faculty with development activities.

The Faculty Development Grant Program provides three rounds of funding annually for regular, full-time faculty.

There have been some changes made to the Faculty Development Grant Program guidelines, effective August 2025:

- Faculty members are limited to receiving only one faculty development grant award per year (fall-spring-summer cycle) to ensure equitable distribution of funding resources, allowing a greater number of faculty members the opportunity to benefit from professional development support. The committee seeks to promote broad participation and enhance the overall impact of the grant program across the institution.
- The spring cycle deadline has been changed from Nov. 15 to Nov. 1.

Applications must have all required elements, including the applicant's curriculum vitae, included in the application packet to be considered by the committee.

Available funding will dictate the number of awards for each round. The Dynamic Form application and program details are available on the <u>ORSP SharePoint site</u>.

The categories of funding application, the maximum amount provided in each category and approved activities for each category are:

- Professional development, \$1,500, instructional improvement activities; course and curriculum development; and attendance at classes, workshops, conferences, pre-conference sessions or seminars related to discipline, research or teaching and learning.
- Conference presentation, \$1,500, presentation at a conference, workshop or seminar; poster or demonstration exhibit; and panelist.

- International travel, \$1,000, faculty research work or presentation at an international conference; group leader may apply for activities in non-native English-speaking country for up to 10 faculty members with limit of \$1,000 per member (only one group travel funded per year); may be used to supplement activities during a Reagan Leave period.
- Research, \$2,000, support for preliminary studies and research leading to external grant proposals.
- Creative projects, \$2,000, workshops, conferences, visiting artist exhibits, visiting guest speakers or experts, or similar activities hosted on the UTM campus; book manuscripts, publications, performances or exhibitions developed by UTM faculty.

October Skyhawk awards announced

This month's recipients of the Skyhawk Innovation Award was Mykaela Waterfield, while Shawn Dye, Payton Morris and Will Turner each received the Skyhawk Spirit Award.

Waterfield, director enrollment communications and operations, received the Skyhawk Innovation Award because of the way she has revolutionized university systems through her leadership in implementing and expanding the Slate CRM platform to serve undergraduate, graduate and international admissions.

Dve, a success counselor on the Student Success Center staff, was nominated for the award because of her commitment beyond success counseling appointments. According to her nomination letter, she partners with campus departments and community organizations to create unique, engaging and meaningful experiences for her students.

"One example of this is her GENS 101 class project, where she organized students to write Christmas cards for local nursing homes, instilling not only a sense of community engagement but also importance of compassion and service," the letter states. "Initiatives like these showcase her creativity and her ability to inspire students to think beyond themselves."

"Payton has taken the initiative to lead training sessions for other administrators, sharing her expertise and knowledge concerning DASH," her letter of nomination states. "She has proven to be a vital resource in coordinating office functions for ORSP and university outreach offices."

Turner, manager of the Office Information Technology Services, received the award because he seeks to maximize resources by securing the best deals on hardware and software, according to his letter of nomination.

"Will exemplifies a dedication to the educational mission of the campus through his efforts to improve and maintain the campus network infrastructure to meet the needs of students, staff and faculty," the letter "Will demonstrates forward thinking in designing solutions that are scalable to meet the ever-expanding needs resulting from technological advancements and growth in our student enrollment."

Each Skyhawk Spirit Award recipient will receive a \$50 cash award and a commemorative plague. Recipients of the Skyhawk Innovation Award will

receive a \$250 cash award and a commemorative plaque.

The Skyhawk Spirit Award and Skyhawk Innovation Award began in January 2024, and both awards seek to recognize employee contributions that exceed expectations for performance.

All regular full- and part-time faculty and staff up to the level of director are eligible to receive Spirit Awards. Independent contractors, temporary employees, volunteers and executive-level staff who report directly to the chancellor and serve as a member of the chancellor's cabinet are not eligible for the Skyhawk Spirit Award.

The Skyhawk Innovation seeks to recognize Award employees who achieve beyond the status quo who implement an idea, initiative, process or system that improves efficiencies

or outcomes.

Criteria for the awards include:

- Performance substantially beyond expectation on a specific assignment, task or goal
- Contributions that have a significant impact on department or university objectives
- Extraordinary efforts above and beyond the normal responsibilities of the position
- An employee who uses initiative and creativity to solve a challenging problem.

Fall back: DST ends Nov. 2

Daylight saving time for 2025 will come to an end in the United States at 2 a.m. local time, Sunday, Nov. 2. People are asked to "fall back" by setting their clocks back one hour before going to bed Saturday night.

Nov. 2 will be a 25-hour day, as the hour from 1 to 2 a.m. will be repeated, giving people an extra hour of sleep. UT Martin and all other areas of the Central Time Zone will fall back to Central Standard Time, moving out of Central Daylight Time.

Daylight saving time will return to the U.S. at 2 a.m. local time, Sunday, March 8, 2026, when areas that observe DST will "spring forward," moving their clocks ahead one hour.

UT Martin, in conjunction with University of Tennessee Extension, will host a "Financing Your Operation in 2026: West Tennessee Row Crop Workshop." You Tell Me

- Question How is the cell tower located in the parking lot next to the steam plant used?
- Answer The tower was built in 2012, is university/state property, and replaced the original tower that once stood in the parking lot next to the Latimer-Smith Engineering and Science Building. Several entities, both university and local, use the tower because of its location in the city. Among those using the tower is WUTM-FM, which has its transmitter and antenna on the tower, along with the university two-way communications system for public safety, maintenance and others. Several years ago, the Tennessee Department of Safety added a repeater on the site, which is the smaller building to the left of the main building. The system is part of the Tennessee Advanced Communications Network (TCAN), which allows state public safety officials to essentially talk to anyone in the state. (https://www.tn.gov/safety/tacn.html) In addition, several amateur radio repeaters are located on the tower, including W4UTM, the primary two-meter repeater. The amateur radio systems are part of the university's emergency communications plan and supported by local amateur radio operators.
