### Homecoming 2025 schedule announced

The 2025 Homecoming Week is underway through Sunday, Oct. 12, and will feature several events for alumni, students and fans alike along with the football game against OVC-Big South Conference rival Western Illinois on Oct. 11.

Homecoming Week will also serve to kick

off the opening ceremony for the university's 125th anniversary celebration. The opening ceremony will be held at 10 a.m., Friday, Oct. 10, in Watkins Auditorium in the Boling University Center, and is open to the public.

The 125th anniversary celebration will

be held throughout the 2025-26 school year and into next October. The university was established in 1900 as the Hall-Moody Institute, with the cornerstone of the administration building being laid on Oct. 2 of that year. The first classes were held on

### 125th anniversary celebration kickoff set for Oct. 10

UT Martin will begin its 125th anniversary celebration with an opening event at 10 a.m., Friday, Oct. 10, in the Phillip W. Watkins Auditorium.

The public is invited to attend and help to begin the year-long celebration of the university's founding as Hall-Moody Institute in 1900. The opening ceremony will be archived on the university's YouTube account for later viewing.

The program's opening speakers include UT System President Randy Boyd and UT Martin Chancellor Yancy Freeman. Other speakers will highlight different periods of university history and include:

• The Past: Bob Carroll, UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame football coach and a 1954 UTM graduate, and Dr. Chandra Alston, the University of Tennessee, and a 1993 UTM graduate;

• The Present: Ashlee Mallon, a junior finance major from Dresden and student trustee to the UT Board of Trustees, and Dr. Sandy Mehlhorn, professor of agricultural engineering and UT Martin Faculty Senate president;

• The Future: Art Sparks, chair, UT Martin Advisory Board, and a 1976 UTM graduate.

A public reception will immediately follow the program on the Boling University Center North Patio outside Watkins

### Maturation grant proposals due Oct. 31

The University of Tennessee Research Foundation (UTRF) announced a call for submissions for its 18th annual maturation program.

The UTRF Technology Maturation Grant aims to assist innovators in advancing new technologies on the path to market by awarding up to \$20,000 in direct costs to the highest ranking proposals.

The program is open to researchers, faculty, staff and students across all University of Tennessee campuses and institutes. All proposals are due to the UT Martin Office of Research and Sponsored Programs (ORSP) by 5 p.m., Oct. 31. Proposals can be emailed to <a href="mailto:orsp@utm.edu">orsp@utm.edu</a>.

Applicants must complete and submit the official UTRF Technology Maturation Grant Proposal form at this site.

Projects must be related to an existing UT

invention disclosure, or a proposal can be accompanied by a new UT invention/creation disclosure. (Visit <u>idea.tennessee.edu</u> to submit a new invention disclosure.)

All proposals should clearly respond to the four questions. Proposals that only generate basic research results should not be submitted.

Applicants should read the application overview and complete the UTRF Technology Maturation Grant Proposal form. Other forms of submission will not be accepted.

The proposal template is limited to two pages, and one page of references and one page of figures may be included as appendices. The complete proposal package must not exceed four pages. No bio or CV should be included.

### Ashburn to speak at PKP Faculty Lecture event

**Dr. Kellie Ashburn**, assistant professor of nursing, will present the Fall Phi Kappa Phi Faculty Lecture at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 16.

The event will be held in the Lew and Mary Jo Daugherty Tennessee Room (Room 22) of the McCombs Center, and will include a livestream option.

Ashburn's lecture, "Learning by Doing: the Impact of Experiential Approaches in Higher Education," will share study results from her doctoral research grounded in Kolb's Experiential Learning Theory and detail practical applications of tactile learning, particularly in health-science fields.

"Nursing practice has continued to broaden in complexity with expanding treatment options, the development of new health science technologies and the overwhelming deluge of medical

information," Ashburn said. "While classroom instruction is still an important foundation for learning, students build judgement and confidence through hands-on experience in clinical settings."

The presentation will highlight the experiential learning program in UT Martin's nursing program, including the university's wide range of partners in the West Tennessee health-care community.

Ashburn teaches across classroom and clinical settings, advises nursing students and is actively engaged in curriculum development and educational research.

Her scholarly interests focus on experiential learning strategies, the development of clinical judgment in undergraduate nursing students and preparation for licensure exams.

Ashburn has presented her work at regional and national conferences and is the recipient of the National League for Nursing Education Scholarship Award, as well as the Rising Star Nurse Leader Award from the Tennessee Action Coalition.

In addition to her faculty role, she continues to practice as a registered nurse at Baptist Memorial Hospital in Union City, ensuring that her teaching and research remain grounded in current clinical practice.

Established on May 21, 1971, UT Martin's Chapter 127 of Phi Kappa Phi was an early example of the society's presence at a regional comprehensive university. The international honor society inducts more than 25,000 students, graduate students, faculty and staff each year on more than 325 campuses across the United States, its territories and the Philippines.

## Faculty Development Grant Program application deadline is Nov. 1

The Office of Research and Sponsored Programs (ORSP) provides funding for internal awards designed to assist UT Martin faculty with development activities.

The Faculty Development Grant Program provides three rounds of funding annually for regular, full-time faculty.

The following changes have been made to the Faculty Development Grant Program guidelines effective last August:

- Faculty members are limited to receiving only one faculty development grant award per year (fall-spring-summer cycle) to ensure equitable distribution of funding resources, allowing a greater number of faculty members the opportunity to benefit from professional development support. The committee seeks to promote broad participation and enhance the overall impact of the grant program across the institution.
- The spring cycle deadline has been changed to Nov. 1 (previously Nov. 15).

Applications must have all of the required elements, including the applicant's curriculum vitae, included in the application packet to be considered by the committee.

The next application deadline is Saturday, Nov. 1

Available funding will dictate the number of awards for each round. The Dynamic Form application and program details are available on the ORSP SharePoint site.

Here is a list of development grant categories, maximum award for each category and a summary of approved activities for each grant category:

- Professional development, \$1,500, instructional improvement activities; course and curriculum development; attendance at classes, workshops, conferences, preconference sessions or seminars related to discipline, research or teaching and learning.
- Conference presentation, \$1,500, presentation at a conference, workshop or

seminar; poster or demonstration exhibit; panelist.

- International travel, \$1,000, faculty research work or presentation at an international conference; group leader may apply for activities in a non-native English-speaking country for up to 10 faculty members with limit of \$1,000 per member (only one group travel funded per year); may be used to supplement activities during a Reagan Leave period.
- Research, \$2,000, support for preliminary studies and research leading to external grant proposals.
- Creative projects, \$2,000, workshops, conferences, visiting artist exhibits, visiting guest speakers or experts or similar activities hosted on the UTM campus; book manuscripts, publications, performances or exhibitions developed by UTM faculty.

On Oct. 2, 1900, the cornerstone was laid for the administration building, the institution's first building, and on Sept. 2, 1901, the first Hall-Moody Institute classes were held.

The institute would become

the Hall-Moody Normal School in 1917 and Hall-Moody Junior College in 1922. In 1927, the state assumed ownership of the campus and the name was changed to UT Junior College before becoming the University of Tennessee Martin Branch in 1951 and, finally, the University of Tennessee at Martin in 1967.
